
#### Progress from Sturt, Australia

As I write this (7th March), I'm almost one-third through my residency at Sturt. I have to say that it was quite hot today. I was in a singlet and shorts which is about what I have been wearing since I got here. I rolled 5/8th thick slabs for several smaller pieces, made them into slings and took them outside. They were dry enough for work in a few hours.

I have several large pieces ready to bisque and have my first smaller test pieces through. It is interesting how being somewhere new without distractions like the phone ringing allows one to focus on a new direction. When I worked in Japan five years ago, I moved from practical uses of my pyramids to an abstract use of them as sculptural units. This began a whole series.

I began here with the first piece of of that series and I brought with me a maquette that had been on the shelf in my studio for over two years with the idea well before that. This has been the new departure point at Sturt. I am currently working on the next piece in the new series and already have interested purchasers . . .

I have done more new pieces using my familiar, formal geometry though the latest one uses pyramids as a direct metaphor for the jumble of white peaks you see as you come into Vancouver over the Coast Range. However, I think the essential essence of a residency is to move from where you were. The accommodation, "Ainsworth," where I live, is full of Svend Bayer pots. He was here for a residency and produced prodigious amounts of Svend Bayer pots.



As I write at 9 p.m. the lights are still on in the Woodshop where students are making the most of their course here. I will be doing a four day workshop after Easter and a wood firing of the Noborigama kiln here before that. There is also an Anagama and a small Ogama for Shino and Oribe. There will be a Woodfire Conference here at Easter in 2007 so put it on your calendar.

The Shiraz - you get 10% off at Woolies if you buy six bottles - is very good but the Kookaburras are noisy in the mornings.

#### Leach Pottery Restoration Project - Spring 2006

Recently acquired funding has saved Bernard Leach's famous pottery in St. Ives. Penwith District Council, the Bernard Leach (St. Ives) Trust and St. Ives Town Council are very pleased to announce that the Leach Pottery Restoration Project in St. Ives has been awarded £450,767 (about \$900,000 CAD) by the European Regional Development Fund and £100,000 (about \$100,00 to \$200,000 CAD) from the Rural Cornwall & Isles of Scilly Partnership.

With these two substantial awards, added to awards from the Heritage Lottery Fund (£610,000) the Arts Council of England South West (£98,685), Cornwall Council Council (£75,000) and from Penwith District Council's own capital programme budget (£75,000), the Council and Trust are now able to 'go live' with the project. The project still needs to raise between £50,000 and £100,000 from supporters throughout the UK and overseas and so we are

today also launching a Public Appeal. For information on how to support the project, email: donations@leachproject.co.uk

In order to save the Leach Pottery site and revive its reputation as a centre for training and inspiration, the council has acquired the pottery.

The project aims to restore and preserve the Leach Pottery for future generations, unlock its potential for generating significant levels of long-term sustainable employment and creative activity, as well as foster emerging talent, open up the site and its history to visitors and create a showcase gallery for contemporary studio pottery. There will be opportunities throughout the year for people to find out more.

The Leach Pottery was the home and workplace of Bernard Leach, and for fifty years the epicentre of the craft pottery movement. After 85 years, the pottery and cottage was put up for sale and in danger of being lost, both as a

place were pots are made and where people can experience something of the spirit of the Leach Pottery in its heyday.

The Leach Pottery site was put on the open market at the beginning of 2003, presenting the community with potentially a unique opportunity to bring this historic site into the public domain and to enhance its regenerative potential for St. Ives and Cornwall. The project has the potential to become an inspirational focus for the revival of studio pottery within the creative industries in Cornwall.

The project will:

- I listed buildings, including the original kiln which is the first example of this type of Oriental climbing kiln in the West;
- ii) create a new museum exhibition space for the interpretation of the site, the life and legacy of Bernard Leach and the story of studio pottery up to the present day, through a programme of changing exhibitions, including use of film, oral history and archival material;
- iii) create a showcase contemporary studio pottery gallery to support and reinvigorate Cornwall's strong pottery cluster,

- and to present this work within an international context:
- iv) create a new pottery training facility accommodating four incubation units and four business start-up units, supported through a programme of professional development under the guidance of a lead potter and University College Falmouth, fostering emerging talent and new SMEs:
- v) create a programme of pottery-based courses and events open to the general public and visitors;
- vi) improve public access and visitor facilities throughout the site

#### **Archival Group**

Last year's 50th Anniversary brought home just how quickly time flies and just how ephemeral the physical links to the past can be. The pots themselves may survive, but the link between potter and pot may fade from memory and be lost. Over the past year Debra Sloan has been having conversations with many people about forming a group to tackle this important historical task. Recently the group was officially launched by having its first meeting on February 10, 2006, in the Guild offices. Gisela Kaempffer has very generously donated several hundred dollars towards our initial projects.

Among the intial tasks is the preservation of the documentary material we already have. We have several books of photos, many slides and 10-20 videos, and voice tapes. All of these need to be properly stored and many need to be transferred to DVD. We are looking for a slide scanner so that we can digitize the slide collection. We have a reasonably complete collection of BC Potters going back about 20 years, but the collection is spotty for earlier copies. Maintaining and extending that valuable collection is a project in itself.

We have a small database of potters marks and chops - less than 10 records so far. But this is an important part of the ephemeral information that we would like to capture and we hope to find a way to efficiently gather it.

# For most of you who read the guild newsletter, visiting a potter's studio is a fairly regular occurrence. For most collectors, however, going to the source is an exciting chance to unravel another piece of the mystery. The collector won't suddenly understand the process, the formulas, the techniques, but he



will see where the elements come together and realize it's not a mystery to everyone.

In 1978, I visited my friend Laura Wee Lay Laq's studio, my first visit to a potter's studio. Laura had a sweet little place near the water in Sooke Harbour on the Island. She had invited a few of us out from Victoria for a Saturday visit, with instructions that she might be late, find the key in the planter next to



the door and make ourselves comfortable. W did arrive first and soon after entering we upset a pot near the door and broke it. The rest of our wait for Laura was consumed with anxiety over that broken pot. It was an awakening for me, when upon hearing our confes-

sion for breaking her beautiful pot, Laura laughed freely saying she had broken many herself over the years. Several years later, I visited Laura in Burnaby, where she was loading a hand-built kiln behind her house with beautifully-shaped pots surrounded by combustibles that would give them



their unique surface. Laura has been spending a great deal of time and energy in the last several years studying and teaching her native language and she tells me recently she has fired her kiln in Chilliwack and is producing some Ollas and salmon and trout plates.



This past year I visited a few ceramics studios in Strathcona where they were open to the public as part of the Eastside Culture Crawl. It is always rewarding to visit Gailan Ngan's studio at the corner of Georgia and Campbell streets. I've been there a number of times and am always impressed not only with the quantity and quality of

her work but also with the progression of new shapes and looks. The difference between the older piece pictured, which to me bears a striking resemblance to the work of her father, and the recent footed bowl with a beautiful pistachio green interior is immediately obvious. On that visit I also went for



the first time to the Red Iron Studio which is next door to Gailan and has an exciting combination of visual arts which includes ceramics.

I have appreciated the visits of several potters to my shop and am always

Audacious Ceramic Subversions In Cheh-Ae Siah Ceramic Installation March 24 - April 22, 2006

Cheh-ae Siah enacts an unruly drama of chance, desire, risk, failure and wishful thinking. Thrown and altered forms burrow into hand-built scaffolding; pinched coils link together and colonize a slip-cast object; found shards are thrust into press-molded slabs. This architecture has an appetite for things - cheap souvenirs, precious objects, failed experiments and figurines. Through the rhetoric of hand-crafting, Sormin's installation embodies the improvisation and uncertainty that characterizes processes of private and public reinvention. Metaphorically and structurally, the work negotiates enclosure and disclosure, porosity and density, mass and lightness, strength and fragility, balance and imbalance, construction and collapse.

Linda Sormin has exhibited nationally and internationally at



Flow Gallery (London, UK, 2006), York Quay Gallery (Toronto, 2005), YingKo Ceramics Museum (Taipei, Taiwan, 2005), Surrey Art Gallery (Surrey, BC, 2004), Lohin-Geduld Gallery (New York 2004), the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts (San Diego, 2003 and Baltimore, 2005), and the World Ceramic Biennale (Korea, 2001). Sormin currently lives and works in Vancouver where she teaches ceramics at Emily Carr Institute.
