

Diane Espiritu

Diane was born in Winnipeg, Man. The desire to direct her life aspirations towards the field of art and design brought her to Vancouver shortly after she obtained her Science Degree from the University of Manitoba. She values excellence and a strong sense of empathy for the user for whom a design of an object is intended. She attributes graduating with the distinction of the Chancellor Award for Design in 2010 from Emily Carr University

to the motivation of the talented colleagues that defined her years at design school. She has worked as an Alumni Ambassador for Emily Carr University and has partnered with her husband to open Espiritu Design Studio. Diane has participated in Vancouver Draw Down 2012 as an installation artist and workshop leader at Satellite Gallery. She exhibited as a collaborating designer in the Vancouver Design Bureau's inaugural show Perched currently showing at Maai Living.

Participating in Evocativa Curiosa is an opportunity for me to offer a story that one woman has of her body and it touches on the physical and emotional scars associated with loss. It tries to capture a fragile moment involving a baby's life lost before its time. It is not uncommon, and the idea is to explore a way to make an evocative connection, offer a marker of memory, participate in an act of self love.

It is reaching between perceptions of the female body as an object of desire and the qualities you might associate with a woman who is bearing a child.

Darcy Greiner

Darcy is a ceramic artist and industrial designer. He was born in the Northwest Territories, had a nomadic upbringing throughout western Canada and now lives and works in Vancouver. He is a recent graduate from Emily Carr University of Art and Design.

The mould is at the centre of my work in ceramics. I am very interested in the relationships that it can have with the objects they produce, and by extension the relationships between ourselves and the environments that shape us. Modular systems of moulding, the mould as object or representation, and even moulds of the moulds are all elements present in my work. Convention and function are challenged and intention is secondary to exploration. I look to how objects can both illuminate and obscure the narrative of their making. The way we make things can be just as intriguing as what we make. In this work, the body is moulded and merged with modules in order to question the way clothing normalizes the body in our culture while simultaneously dividing and segmenting it. These divisions in turn become sites of entry and even eroticism. Leon Popik

Leon Popik received his Diploma from Alberta College of Art in Calgary, Alta., in 1991 and later a B.F. A. in 1999. He worked for Northmount Pleasant Art Centre in Calgary Alberta from 1991-2000 as a ceramic technician and instructor. My Grandmother's Blue Bowl By Sharon H. Nelson

Sharon's article and recipe below speak to the connection between the functional pots that we create and the food that we share with family and friends. With the Canadian Clay Symposium coming up-on the theme of form, function, feast-and the PGBC members' exhibition Dish it Up showing March 7 to April 1, Sharon reminds us on a more personal level why our pots and the food they hold are important. Sharon isn't a member of the PGBC, but we welcome submissions relating to clay and clay culture from interested supporters wherever they live.

After my grandmother died, despite sometimes stormy relations all round, I helped my mother sort out what was left of my grandmother's household possessions. The basement storage area was cramped and grimy, and all my grandmother's things would go to charity anyway; no one in the family wanted old things. When we were almost done, my mother picked up my grandmother's Pesach mixing bowl and inspected it with a critical look familiar to me. Almost as an afterthought, it seemed, she held the bowl out towards me, her eyebrows raised. Would I use it? Of course.

My grandmother's blue bowl is the bowl that I've reached for almost daily for decades. It is the bowl into which I slice peaches or apples for cakes and crisps and cobblers, and fruit for fruit salad; in which I mix the dough for mohn cookies and cheese pies and verenikes and mandel brott; where vegetables

It is the alchemist's bowl, in which experiments with texture and flavour take place, and in which memories mingle, as each cook and baker, aunt and bobba, is made present in her own particular recipe or technique.

Until I started writing about it, I never wondered about the provenance of my grandmother's blue bowl. It was just there, a presence in my kitchen, used so frequently that it's placed on the shelf I most easily reach. My grandmother's blue bowl, it turns out, was made in England by T.D. Green and Co. between 1900 and 1910. It is now, therefore, a genuine antique. From its age and provenance, I surmise that my grandmother brought the bowl with her from England when, as a young woman, she emigrated to Canada with the father who had carried her as an infant from Odessa to Salonika, and then via Paris to London. Bubbie Lily, as she became, used this bowl every year for more than half a century as she prepared for Passover, a holiday that celebrates emigration.

My grandmother's blue bowl is perfectly proportioned and shaped for its purpose, with a very high glaze that insures that nothing sticks to it. It carries in its interior brightness and light. In reality, though, the bowl I think

of as my grandmother's blue bowl is not blue at all. Its outside is a nondescript colour between buff and tan. Inside, though, where I look when I work, it is a glorious, up-cheering, robin's egg blue.

Deceptively plain from outside, beautifully glazed and purpose fit inside, it is a bowl you'd never look at twice or imagine is in any way special, or particularly strong, or suited to long journeys, or serious work, or an extremely long and very useful life. It is a happy bowl, a happy colour, and when I work with it, it makes me happy too.

Recipe: Mandel Brott

Mandel brott is crisp enough to satisfy a craving for texture but is neither rich nor filling. It keeps indefinitely, can be refreshed in an oven that is cooling down from other baking, and its preparation requires no special equipment.

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup oil
- · 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 31/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder (3 if gluten free flour)
- 2 teaspoons xantham gum (a binder) if using gluten free flour
- ¾ cup whole almonds
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon (optional) or grated rind of 1 lemon (optional)

Toast the almonds and chop them medium fine in a food processor. Set aside.

Sift flour, baking powder, and cinnamon, if using, in processor. Reserve.

In a large bowl, beat the eggs with a fork or whisk. Add sugar and beat well. Add oil and vanilla and beat until the mixture is thick and creamy. Add flour mixture a little at a time. Start with 3 cups of flour and add more as needed. Dough should be soft. Add almonds and cinnamon or lemon rind if using. Dough should pull away from the sides of the bowl but should not be stiff.

Cut the dough into 4 portions. To make portions the same size, weigh each and redistribute as necessary. To make the loaves

from which the Mandel Brott takes its name, form each piece of dough into a ball. With the palms of your hands, and without additional flour, roll the dough on a counter or table top using the same motion as with a rolling pin to form a rope of uniform thickness. Make the rope at least an inch shorter than the length of your pan. Put the rope on an ungreased and preferably parchment-lined cookie sheet. Cover the dough with waxed paper, and with a rolling pin or your hand or another pan, flatten the rolls so they resemble loaves 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -3 inches wide and $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ inches high. Allow at least an inch for expansion between loaves.

Bake at 350° until light brown, 15-20 minutes. Remove from the oven as soon as loaves are firm and lift easily from the pan. Do not brown. Cool on the pan only until the loaves are barely cool enough to handle, then move one by one to a large cutting surface. With a sharp knife, slice each loaf into pieces $\frac{1}{2} - \frac{3}{4}$ inch thick, then lay each slice on its side on the cookie sheet. Bake a further 10 minutes or until just starting to colour. Cool on racks. Store air tight in a tin lined with waxed paper.

Ingredients Note: Mandel Brott is traditionally made without cinnamon or lemon rind. These additions make it more like its Italian cousin, the biscotta.

Equipment Note: Cookie sheets are much easier than jelly roll pans for this recipe because the loaves come off the pans hot and break easily. With cookie sheets, the rolls can be pushed rather than lifted off. Baking parchment provides a completely clean, non-stick surface and insures easy clean-up.

When such top-notch ceramic artists grace our little corner of the world, there is bound to be some spillage...read: "Workshop Opportunities". Each workshop offers unique insights into the creative processes of our world-class presenters. Enrich your Symposium experience by signing up for one!

Lorna Meaden, a master of wheel thrown and altered porcelain forms, is a perfect presenter to explore our themes of "Form, Function, and Feast" at the upcoming Symposium. Lorna's signature pots convey a generous sense of volume and a fluidity of line. Lorna's use of pattern and rhythm unify her slip inlay and resist decorative techniques, while her rich and earthy palette is enhanced by the tactile surface created during Lorna's soda firings.

Lorna received an MFA in ceramics from Ohio University in June of 2005. She has been a resident artist at the Archie Bray Foundation and at the Anderson Ranch Arts Center as well as a demonstrator and lecturer at NCECA in 2008. Lorna works from her own studio in Durango, Colo., and is an adjunct professor of art at Fort Lewis College.

Alberta Sanchez Mateo and Macrina Mateo Martinez (Oaxaca Mexico), recipients of numerous regional and national awards of excellence, continue the tradition of utilitarian burnished terra cotta pottery that has existed in their family and pueblo for many centuries. In their traditional farming pueblo, they draw upon pre-Colombian methods, while also introducing new forms and improved quality. Alberta and Macrina create large round cooking pots ("ollas"), clay griddles for cooking tortillas ("comals"), cups and saucers, bowls,

plates and vases. Using a quick-fire method, similar to a carefully tended bonfire on the open ground, these potters fire their pieces in a style representative of how pottery has been fired for thousands of years in most of the indigenous Americas.

John Cloutier By Keith Rice-Jones

Our potting community is saddened with the untimely passing of John Cloutier. John has given so much, not only to our community but also to his profession as a chef. Most potters thought of him as a chef and his chefs, as a potter.

As in all things, John was a generous giver of himself to both these major aspects of his life. His outspoken, always with a touch of humour, views on issues always came from caring about the individuals involved. It might have been encouraging the best with the team he was working with for the Culinary Olympics or arriving early at the back of an east end cooking school to clear up needles before anyone else arrived. The school changed the lives of many young people. He was a mentor to many at the Burnaby Potters Guild and a generous sharer of his raku expertise.


When John served on the board of the Potters Guild of BC, he was particularly interested in helping young people at the beginning of their involvement with clay. He was the instigator of the Oven and Kiln initiative that brought together the two sides of his world to raise funds for ceramic education, primarily aimed at high school students planning to pursue ceramics. The Oven and Kiln continues as the primary fundraiser of the North-West Ceramic Foundation whose principal aim is ceramic education.

In 2003, the guild was in financial crisis and almost went under. John was part a "dream board" that stepped up in rescue mode. There was a tremendous response from membership at that time, but it was the residue of the education fund that John had raised, which was not being adequately accessed, that was an enormous boost to the guild's recovery.

John was an original maker, drawing on many sources. He is well remembered for arriving at one of the guild's Made of Clay sales with just three pots. While everyone else set up booths and laid-out their collection of work, John simply put his pots on plinths, sat on his stool and waited for sales. He was the best seller at the sale!

When I wrote this, John was still with us and—typically—he had requested some single malt, and enjoyed a last taste of Talisker before he left us. John will be sorely missed by his family, his many friends, and our potting community. Though our community will be diminished by his passing, we are richer for having had him as part of us. We will miss his colourful presence.

John passed away peacefully in his sleep in the early morning of Jan. 27.
