

September Exhibition: Sally Michener

Back to the Future, curated by Mary Fox Sept. 5 to Oct. 1; Opening Sept. 5, 5 to 7 p.m.

Sally Michener has been an active participant in the ceramic and visual arts community in Canada for more than 40 years. Her role as a teacher and working artist has insured that her influence has been felt by many generations of artists, collectors, critics, and the art viewing public. She is probably best known for her large scale interior and exterior installations. Yet it is her crossover status which distinguishes Michener from other working artists. Over the years she has played an important role within the competitive visual arts scene in this country while at the same time remaining a leader in the clay arts movement.

The Leach tradition of wheel-thrown subtly glazed ceramics is the foundation of modern

studio ceramics. As a university student in Minnesota, Michener enthusiastically embraced the technique but found herself creating add-ons to her pieces: human and animal forms or other natural images. That led to hand building and an artistic trajectory that rapidly advanced a unique vision. The column, which appears throughout art history, is seen in Michener's early works as the base for a hand-built tea bowl or a serving dish. Later, two columns became legs to support a rectangular surface, making a table or morphing into an arch. A single terra cotta column created by the centuries old coil technique reflects the proportions of the human body and has a face at the apex built from a life mask. A contingent of these columns was employed by Michener to create the Granville Island Hill Installation in 1981 (see: www.surrey.ca/files/Michener1.pdf).

The human body is a recurring image in Sally Michener's art. Etched, drawn or in three dimensions, it is more than a motif. It is a visual articulation of the possibility of exploring space and interacting with it. Michener's first installation was a garden that she designed and executed for the gallery at Presentation House. There were planters containing live plants, tables and tiles creating a pathway through the exhibition space. Thus the human body can be an image or it can be you and me walking through an environment made by the artist.

Sally Michener's artistic importance cannot be assessed without seeing the ambitious installations she's created over the years for

galleries, gardens and public spaces. It's in these works that you come face to face with her immense productivity and ability to take a theme and explore it in countless mutations. This exhibition of smaller works is but a suggestion of what is seen in a fully realized Michener installation. However, it does lead the viewer through aspects of the formal evolution of her iconography and technique culminating in the magnificent heads encrusted with coloured tiles and ceramic shards she is making today. What is evident in these works is the continuity. What is past is also seen in the present. Past is prologue. Back to the future.

about his processes and glazing techniques. I have always been drawn to the brilliant colors of his work, as that kind of color intensity is not often seen within ceramic glaze surfaces. As someone who loves to experiment with glaze recipes, I wanted to learn anything that I could about his work. I was fortunate to receive a studio tour, a throwing demonstration and a glazing demonstration! He was so enthusiastic and informative and gladly answered any questions that I had. I was incredibly thankful for his willingness to share his years of experience and knowledge with me. What more can you ask for than being able to create beautiful pottery in a place as beautiful as the Kootenays! Seeing the studio set up and how an artist works within that space is extremely helpful and it is these curiosities, questions and journeys that I will take with me as I continue to pursue my own artistic journey.

Special Sculpture September at the Shadbolt

September promises to be an exciting month at the Shadbolt Centre for the Arts in Burnaby. Well-known American figurative sculptors, mother and daughter Nan Jacobsohn and Beth Cavener Stichter will each present a workshop on their unique approaches to sculpting the animal form in clay.

Nan Jacobsohn's weekend workshop on Sept. 21 and 22 (already full; see info on a free lecture option at the end of this article) provides an intimate setting for 12 students to work alongside this American master. Using a special armature, she demonstrates a unique way of approaching the structural challenge of a standing pose.

In the hands of Beth Cavener Stichter, the use of animals to articulate the human condition is powerful, visceral, evocative and disturbing. She writes, "In order to try to coax people into empathizing with the work, I switched to using the animal form to express the human condition. These figures are human bodies that have been subtly morphed into other creatures. They have belly-buttons, collarbones, and surgical scars that I bear on my own body. Most of them have human genitalia. A good deal of the time, these details escape immediate notice. What really drives the work is the attempt to overcome my own assumption about the thoughts, motivations and feelings contained beneath the surface. There is an assumed moral and emotional innocence that we associate with the animal image which allows me to delve into territory which we normally find too uncomfortable to dwell on."

Beth's demonstration, taking place over three days Sept. 27 to 29 in the studio theatre, promises to engage the audience with a physical performance. Working with over 500 lbs of clay, the artist uses her whole body to move the mass around; striking it with chunks of wood, digging into the surface with the palms of her hand and nails. The second stage of Cavener Stichter's process is what she refers to as preserving. She hollows the sculpture, piece by piece, turning the mass into an empty shell.

"I gain a secret satisfaction from all this weight loss. I like to hum into these dark closed interiors, listening to and feeling the deep vibration of my voice distorted in answer. I think about closing myself in, slipping them on like skins. I imagine being enfolded within a wild hare, ears laid back, body tensed...waiting."


Writes Sharon Reay, programmer at the Shadbolt, "Beth has never been here to Vancouver before and it took three years of planning to bring this very busy lady to our fair city. She has done workshops in both Japan and Tuscany so far this year and we are likely her last one for a while – and are very fortunate to be hosting this event. Her appeal is not just for sculptors – anyone interested in the artistic process will benefit from attending this workshop."

Concordia University's Department of Studio Arts invites applications for one tenure-track position in Ceramics for July 1, 2014. Studio Arts is the largest department in the Faculty of Fine Arts and enjoys a longstanding reputation as one of Canada's foremost environments for the study and creation of visual art. Ceramics is a growing program of study within Studio Arts. Linked to a rich and diverse material culture history, it is the only university-level program in Quebec and one of the few university-level Ceramics programs in Canada. The successful candidate will be expected to teach Ceramics courses at the graduate and undergraduate levels, participate in the coordination and development of the Ceramics curriculum, and perform required administrative duties in order to further develop this program, the MFA program and the department of Studio Arts, as necessary.

The ideal candidate should have a strong critical/theoretical background and a contemporary understanding of both extended and discipline-based approaches to ceramics material practices. Preference will be given to candidates who are clearly committed to ceramics as a medium and who demonstrate technical expertise in two or more of the following areas: hand-building, clay and glaze technology, mould-making processes, and two or three-dimensional media.

Applicants should possess a completed MFA degree, a strong exhibition record, college and/or university teaching experience, demonstrated knowledge of ceramics history and theory and a record of administrative experience and committee service. Although classes are taught in English, fluency in French is considered an asset.

A National Survey of Contemporary Canadian Emerging Ceramists

Opening at the Burlington Art Centre on Sept. 7
