

# **DEAR HUMAN: Jasna Sokolovic and Noel O'Connell**

The North-West Ceramics Foundation is pleased to announce Jasna Sokolovic and Noel O'Connell as featured speakers at a free public lecture Thursday, Feb. 19, at 7:30 p.m. Drawing on their shared history, Sokolovic and O'Connell will discuss their design philosophy, projects and migration towards an entirely collaborative practice. The lecture will be held in Room 245 in the North Building of Emily Carr University of Art + Design (1399 Johnston Street, Granville Island, Vancouver). All are welcome and encouraged to attend.

Sokolovic studied in the former Yugoslavia at the School of Architecture, University of Sarajevo/University of Belgrade from 1989 to 1993. After immigrating to Canada, she attended Emily Carr University, receiving her BFA in 2000. In 2009, she was awarded the Winifred Shantz Award for Ceramics. O'Connell received a BS from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, in 1999, and an MFA in Ceramics from the Rhode Island School of Design in 2009. He studied at Chiang Mai University in Thailand from 1997 to 1998 and held a Fulbright Scholarship there from 2000 to 2001. From 2004 to 2007, he was the design director and co-founder of Mei Design Co. in Jingdezhen, China.

The two met in 2008 at a residency in Denmark and immediately began to work together. In 2009, they founded a creative studio in Vancouver known as **Dear Human**, which works across a number of media and domains including public space projects, product design and applied arts. In 2011, they were artists-in-residence at Medalta, and, in 2013, they undertook a self-directed research project on ceramic tiles in Lisbon, Portugal. While both have a background in ceramics, they have broadened their approach to working with clay to encompass additional materials and opportunities.

Their work has been featured nationally and internationally in design events, journals, blog sites and radio programs. Projects include Finders/Keepers (2011), in which 300 hand-made heart-shaped ceramic magnets were dispersed around Granville Island, to be treasured or gifted by those who found them; Dinner with Neighbors (2012), an installation of hand-printed retro factory blanks celebrating local food traditions, commissioned by the Vancity Credit Union in South Burnaby; Patchworked in Canada (2014), staged in several Canadian cities using vintage ceramic tiles displayed in unexpected locations; Wallpapering (2014), in which recycled paper was formed into tiles and printed, painted and interspersed with handmade ceramic tiles to create colourful wall designs; and Re-Mapping An Island (2014), a mural commissioned by Vancity mapping the two islands that comprise the city of Richmond. Many projects invite public participation in the form of finding and photo-documenting the dispersed objects, or they call attention to local cultural traditions to establish a bond with the community. Combining O'Connell's material knowledge and attention to detail with Sokolovic's improvisational sensibility, Dear Human draws inspiration from new environments, new materials and collaborating with artists, designers and architects.

# Don Hutchinson at Museum of Anthropology by Carol Mayer

Don Hutchinson is retiring after 50 years as a teacher and potter. In recognition of his contributions to B.C. ceramics, the UBC Museum of Anthropology has installed two of his works in the Walter C. Koerner Gallery of European Ceramics. A few weeks ago I spent a few hours with Don and we talked about the past 50 years. He started by telling me that he started at the Vancouver School of Art in 1964 looking for a way he could combine his interest in painting and sculpting and thought the solution was in making forms that he could paint. Not that simple, "it was awful, really, really difficult; it never came naturally to me".

He persevered under the tutelage of Robert Weghsteen, Heinz Laffen and Wayne Ngan and gradually started to master technique. He remembered Weghsteen saying "Ok, you've got twenty years to learn the craft and the rest of your life to learn the art. Don't start the other way around, don't think you start with the art and then stick the craft onto it." And Wayne Ngan challenging him to match the translucency of the skin on the glazed ducks hanging in the butchers windows in

Chinatown. From this experience he learned, he didn't have to rely on colour charts. "You




don't have to do it that way, you do it by observing and then trying," says Don.

He was very influenced by Harry Davis who held workshops based on using local materials and developing techniques that emulated those used by earlier craftsmen who didn't rely on electricity.

After art school, Don started to teach at Langara, intending to be there for about five years – this stretched into thirty. During his tenure at Langara he taught hundreds of students, taking them out on field trips, with fellow potter Tam Irving, in search of natural materials. All this was very labour intensive but Don thrived on the adventure, travelling to museums in many parts of the world, absorbing the myriad of influences – glazes, forms, decorative techniques, colours and so forth.

He said, "in Korea it is said that after investing all his skill and finesse the potter can only claim one third of the pot as his. The second third belongs to the fire; it sets the pot, colours it and textures it. The third part of the pot belongs to the owner who has to use it for 20 years, and after that it has a chance to be beautiful, because all three now come together." In his retirement he intends to continue his adventures by travelling and painting – hard to believe he may not make another pot, or owl, or beaver.

# Studio Visit: Langara College & Sarah Coote



This month I caught up with artist and instructor Sarah Coote to check out a studio that's been home to many different PGBC members: the Ceramics Department at Langara College! Sarah, a talented and accomplished potter in her own right, has been running Langara's Ceramics Department for almost twenty years. As you might imagine, there was plenty of insight to mine from her work as artist, educator and studio manager.

# How long has the ceramics program been running at Langara? Who started the program and who's involved now?

The Ceramics Department, part of Langara's Fine Arts Diploma Program, has been running since the early days of the college. Don Hutchinson was the first to take on the role and really pioneer the program, working there for over 30 years; he retired in 2003.

Although there are occasional sessional instructors - for example we currently have Alwyn O'Brien teaching a 'special topics' Surface and

Decoration course - the ceramic area of the fine arts program at Langara is very small and intimate; I'm basically it. That said, I've been lucky to have Joanne Zabudsky, the fine arts program assistant, who has gone above and beyond her job description. She's been an invaluable asset to the ceramics area as well as the larger fine arts program, and has helped in many capacities over the years.

### How did you approach the position when you initially came in? Was there any hesitation stepping into the shoes of one person who had been running the department for nearly thirty years?

I started part-time in 1992 and Don and I worked together as a team for around 10 years. It was great working together as Don was very generous and open both to me and to my ideas. Even though we might come from different artistic backgrounds we both have a deep passion for ceramics and have fought hard (both independently and when we've worked together) for our area at Langara securing space and upgrades to the ceramics area facilities.

I wasn't nervous when Don announced he was retiring and I was offered the position, but it was a significant moment because of all he had done. I am glad to have had that crossover, to learn from Don and experience the studio with him.

### There are a few different ceramics programs in the Lower Mainland. What do you try to offer with your department at Langara?

It comes down to concept and process for me, recognizing that each informs the other. I'm process-oriented and concerned about understanding and responding to the materials in an engaged and intelligent way.

# You aren't just a teacher of course. You're also an artist. Tell me a bit more about your artistic background and interests?

I studied at Sheridan with Bruce Cochrane, at NASCAD (BFA) with Walter Ostrom, and at Alfred University (MFA). I have been and continue to be a potter. When I make functional pottery I try to give utility and beauty an equal role. For me the most direct way to do this is to use function as the inspiration. Using a combination of throwing and hand building techniques I reinterpret traditional forms used for eating and serving food on.

Coming from the East Coast, I recognized my work had a different aesthetic than that of the Leach tradition, so integrated here in the west coast. Colour and glaze experimentation are very important to my work, as is my cut-and-paste approach to form. Right now, I'm working in two kinds of Cone 6 clay, experimenting with oxidation and reduction glaze firing.

### How have you found the balance between being an artist and a full-time teacher?

I don't know how I've done it or continue to do it but I feel like I've been able to make time for both. It's come down to a lot of energy and determination. I have a home studio that I've always made a point of scheduling time for, even with a full-time job and a family. Scheduling is important on both sides though, as I've been known to spend sixteen hours straight in my studio.

### Have these two different career paths informed one another?

Yes, that's inevitable but in the best way. I find myself drawing from experiments I see happening in the studio, particularly as it relates to glazes and materials, but perhaps

more importantly, the approach students take as they work with clay for the first time. I find the attitudes of beginning studentswho come to the studio free of any baggagerefreshing. They remind me to be open to new possibilities and different ways of working.

### What are you working on right now in the studio?

Right now I'm working on a series of large platters using bisque molds and handbuilding. I typically work in series as repetition enables me to work through an idea.

#### What are your future plans?

Eventually I hope to take some time to really focus on my own work and perhaps do a residency. I had the opportunity to go to Jingdezhen in 2006 at the PWS Experimental Factory and found that to be a very rewarding experience and am interesting in doing something similar. In the meantime, I'm getting another group of students ready to graduate with their diplomas on April 22. The public is invited to attend this event and it's always exciting to see the body of work developed by the students. Each one gets to show a few pieces from the various areas they've worked in so you get the full scope of the fine arts program at Langara.
