

The North-West Ceramics Foundation hosted the ninth From Oven and Kiln dinner/auction on May 15 at the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club. This event has been the main vehicle for raising money to sponsor the increasingly well-attended NWCF Speaker Series, support for the keynote speaker at the Canadian Clay Symposiums, and monies for the NWCF Award. This biannual event is formed around a dinner, interrupted by silent auctions, raffles and presentations about NWCF Award recipients. There is an online and a hard copy catalogue with the donated auction items, along with artist biographies. The highlight of the evening is the parade and trade of dessert plates - one for every guest. Dave Carlin, an ardent collector, was our lively MC again this year. All of the ceramics are generously donated. From Oven and Kiln is organized entirely by volunteers. Cheryl Stapleton brought in a special group who assisted with the auction and sales. Many thanks to Deb Dugdale, Pam Harvey, Gerald Joe, Lisa Kolbuc, Molly Magid, and Freddie Rahn for your gracious contribution.

This year the bidding on the silent auctions was intense and very competitive, and it is apparent that a core group of collectors is forming. What was most interesting was the re-sale value of ceramics made by our elder potters – where the pieces went for far more than their original value. This means that a secondary market value is being created. The secondary market is the perceived long-term interest [or not] in a person's work, and is key to establishing values in the ceramic practice in B.C. over the long term. Artists need an audience – people who are interested and informed. Promoting, educating and establishing support of B.C. ceramics and the artists, is central to the planning of this event. The auction/dinner raises monies to support the NWCF educational program, while simultaneously creating increased patronage of the excellent work being made by B.C. ceramics artists.

The NWCF deeply appreciates how B.C. ceramic artists have generously supported nine From Oven and Kiln auction/dinners, by willingly donating high quality work and beautiful plates.

### 2015 NWCF Award Winner Gailan Ngan by Amy Gogarty

The North-West Ceramics Foundation is pleased to announce Gailan Ngan as its 2015 NWCF Award winner. The award, which includes a cheque for \$5000, was presented at the Foundation's major fundraising dinner, From Oven and Kiln, held this year at the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club on Friday, May 15.

The Award recognizes and supports talent in the ceramic arts. It is awarded to an individual who has resided and worked in BC for at least 5 years, who has exhibited his or her work publicly and who has demonstrated an on-going commitment to the ceramics community. The recipient is selected by a panel of experts knowledgeable about BC ceramics and consisted this year of ECUAD

Ceramics professor Julie York, representing the Foundation; curator and scholar Diane Carr, and ceramic artist Bob Kingsmill.

Gailan Ngan was introduced to ceramics and visual art at an early age, serving first as a studio assistant and later apprentice to her father, noted ceramist Wayne Ngan. She established an independent studio, Cornershop, in 1997, and graduated from the Emily Carr Institute of Art and Design in 2002. Her ceramics, which are characterized by soft, organic forms, luscious glazes and subtle surface decoration, have been exhibited at the Canadian Craft Museum, the Museum of Anthropology, Centre A International Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, the Western Front and the Banff Centre for the Arts. Her work is in collections including the Doris Shadbolt Collection at the Helen and Morris Belkin Gallery at the University of British Columbia. A full-time artist, she divides her time between Vancouver and Hornby Island.

The panel was particularly impressed by the deceptively simple, elegant and classic qualities of Gailan's work, and by its capacity to be both contemplative and functional. Respecting tradition, she nonetheless pursues innovation and experimentation in her work. Explaining the jury's decision, Bob Kingsmill wrote "There is a dignity in the work and the woman. The pieces she makes continue to develop in sophistication and subtlety, and there is every indication that this will continue."

We extend our fondest congratulations to Gailan Ngan and look forward to her new projects.

### Robert Weghsteen, 1929 - 2015

We are very fortunate to have had Robert Weghsteen as part of our ceramic community for the last 59 years. Robert was born in Belgium in 1929. He studied art in Belgium from 1945 to 1949 and from there studied art in London at the Cultural School of Art and Craft until 1951, where he studied throwing and working with slip on stoneware and earthenware. He then set up his first studio in his parents garden where he produced stoneware pottery until being call upon for an 18-month military duty.

Robert's connection to Vancouver was through his marriage to his English art school companion Joanne who was from Vancouver.

In 1956, Robert moved with Joanne to Vancouver and found employment at the B.C. Ceramics Factory and, by 1957, he started teaching at the Vancouver School of Art where he taught and inspired students like Tam Irving, Don Hutchinson and Wayne

By 1958, Robert had set up a studio in his home in West Vancouver and by 1961 had his first one-man show in the Vancouver Art Gallery back when the art gallery would



exhibit craft.

Apart from being an amazing functional potter Robert produced massive murals for places like the Nanaimo Hospital and a church in Montreal, the UBC Dental building and a very large mural inside the new Vancouver International Airport where his assistant was Don Hutchinson.

Robert by then had moved to Langley and set up a studio in an old 3000-squarefoot chicken barn, where he could produce ceramics on a massive scale.

I worked there for a time after I graduated from art school in 1982, and when Robert was ready to retire he sold me the contents of his studio. I am still using his kiln, dough mixer, scales, etc., plus will probably never run out of tin or cobalt oxide as he had bought all of his materials 50 pounds at a time. I always thought that potters never retire they just made pots until old age catches up. Robert's method of producing pots on an industrial scale had caught up with his body and it was time for a change.

Retirement did not last long. While living in Tsawwassen, Robert found the Delta Pottery Club where he taught for nine years and could not control his urge to pot and eventually set up a studio in his garage.

In 2005, the Potters Guild of BC was celebrating 50th anniversary, and Robert was awarded a lifetime membership that year. We should embrace the abundant and diverse life of pottery that Robert Weghsteen has left the British Columbian ceramic community.



# Flora & Fauna at the Potters Place By Cory Sandler



May's featured artist at the Potters Place in downtown Courtenay was Ramona Gregory, with Flora & Fauna. We will be introducing a new pottery line by this very talented potter.

As a potter and painter, Ramona has long admired forms in nature, which has translated into her work in various ways. Her most recent pottery line, Flora & Fauna, uses scientific illustrations to delve into the world of biology and anatomy, with images of everything from sea creatures, to insects, to a biological heart. Flora & Fauna began years ago when Ramona stumbled upon the beautiful illustrations of Ernst Haeckel and knew she had to incorporate them into her work. Ernst Haeckel (1834–1919) was a German biologist, naturalist, philosopher, physician, professor, and artist who discovered, described and named thousands of new species, mapped a genealogical tree relating all life forms, and coined many terms in biology.

After some experimenting, Ramona devised a way to add the images to her wheel-thrown stoneware pieces using a printer and decal transfer process. Each piece is thrown using a white stoneware clay, fired and glazed to Cone 6. Vessel interiors are a variegated blue like the depths and layers of the sea, which contrast beautifully with the pale white and sea-foam green exteriors.

Ramona's functional work calls on us to contemplate the intersection of science and art while we sip coffee from an octopus mug. Her pieces inspire the user to marvel at the beauty, mystery, symmetry and strangeness of the natural world.

### New Grads of the PGBC: Haide-Anne James

This new feature will introduce PGBC members who have recently graduated from a ceramics program in B.C. They will be sharing their graduation projects with us over the next few months. We welcome this new creative energy and talent into the guild! Our first grad is Haide-Anne James (BFA, ECUAD), whose grad project "Lagomorph" (image on cover) was the Circle Craft Award winner this year.

Artist Statement: Obsessional is how I would describe my relationship with the malleable and technically demanding media that is clay. Since my first throwing class at Emily Carr University of Art + Design, my fascination and respect for the humbling stuff continues to grow. Strongly influenced by literature and poetry, I had expected to pursue illustration and painting while in school. However, the endless potential of the 3D ceramic form, its receptive inside/outside surfaces and its intrinsically enduring and archival nature has captured my imagination and dominated my studio work ever since.


*Lagomorph* is one result of my research of the vessel as a representation of time and memory.

A study in contrast and layering of meaning, it is a literal and metaphorical earthenware container for the childhood experience of Red Rose Tea's collectibles: slip cast figurines are mashed up with the classic wheel thrown and assembled Greek form. Themes of balance and humoralism are represented by matte black and yellow (dry/cool/earth and dry/warm/fire) while the glossy mass of rabbits reference phlegm/water.

I realize I am illustrating and telling stories, very human stories and mythologies via my graphically colourful and historically referential sculptural forms.

A Poor Woman's Wedgwood: Cloverdale Pattern is a playfully serious critique of the ceramic vessel as a representation of class and social standing. Themes of Colonialism, feminism and rural farm life in western Canada are called up via the endlessly useful and ubiquitous bucket form adorned with slip cast Red Rose Tea collectibles. Referencing the classic Greek amphora the vessel is assembled from earthenware slab and wheel thrown components.

# **Looking for info on Frances Gatewood**

This request comes from Allan Collier, who taught at the University of Victoria and who has done extensive research on B.C. ceramics (plus collects and loans to exhibitions):

Does anyone know anything about Frances Gatewood (1903-91), one of the first graduates of the Vancouver School of Decorative and Applied Art (VSDAA) who also taught there between 1931 and 1940? She shared a studio with well-known bookbinder Dorothy Burnett (Craft Centre Studio, 675 Dunsmuir St) and marketed pottery under the name Vancraft Potteries. She also exhibited pottery at the Vancouver Art Gallery. After her time at the VSDAA, I believe she was a school teacher and lived in West Vancouver.

#### Art & Wine Tour, Kootenays


